Message from our Leadership

Building Momentum as a Collective

Let's start with the blunt truth: 2023 was another *tough* year. Inflation hit Canadians hard, climate emergencies plagued various locales, and impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic lingered. These layered, co-mingling challenges meant an increased demand for services, with many organizations struggling to meet that demand.

Everything that we, at Imagine Canada, did in 2023 was designed to support organizations now and in the future. It was a difficult year, but one of opportunity to build on our renewed collective energy from 2022 to, alongside you all from the sector, build momentum.

Momentum was particularly high on the policy front. Collectively, our sector poured energy into building our vision for a home in government for the nonprofit sector. At our annual Hill Day event in Ottawa in September, forty-five representatives from organizations across the country had the opportunity to raise the profile of the nonprofit sector, build relationships with Parliamentarians, and champion collective public policy priorities. These priorities included policy recommendations made in response to certain government proposals that would have negative consequences for organizations. An example of this are the proposed changes to the Alternative Minimum Tax announced in Budget 2023 that would have decreased the value of current tax incentives for donations to charities,

including the Charitable Donations Tax Credit. Our network organized to prevent these changes and preserve what effectively are subsidies that support the delivery of services to communities during this challenging time for both charities and Canadians. Thanks to the sector's advocacy, the government revised its proposal in order to mitigate some of the impact on donations-work on this and other files will continue.

Year after year, one goal that we never lose sight of, and make conscious efforts to constantly prioritize, is our commitment to anti-racism and anti-oppression. Diversity, equity and inclusion (EDI) principles are top of mind when we design projects and initiatives. But we acknowledge that we still have work to



do in this area, and we are not alone. In July, with the Equitable Recovery Collective, we released the first comprehensive study to explore what Canadian charities and nonprofits are doing to advance EDI within their organizations. The study showed that while most nonprofit leaders support EDI, far fewer pursue it with deep intentionality. This study was a true wake-up call for leaders of nonprofits, especially of white-led organizations. Regardless of the mission, all organizations have a responsibility to advance equity and address systemic discrimination and racism. Shifting mindsets and dedicating time and resources are critical to making meaningful progress. If you haven't yet, we urge you to review the findings and the recommendations from this study.

Another way to learn about the findings of the study is by listening to the episode on this topic of our *Let's Imagine* podcast. The release of the podcast in 2023 is an initiative that we are particularly proud of. It is an opportunity to unpack complex issues, and dig deep on a variety of topics of interest to nonprofit professionals, such as studies, or build momentum on policy files. It is also a space to platform diverse voices and reach a broader audience.

Expanding the organizations we serve was also a priority in 2023. And so we revamped our membership model to make it more inclusive and accessible. Organizations have traditionally paid based on their size and revenue. As a result of the new membership offering, more pricing tiers are now in place and small charities and nonprofits don't pay anything at all. Essentially, we said, *just come on in*. It worked; membership has increased by 48% in the past year. We are particularly pleased by the growing interest of Quebec-based organizations to join us. Given the



reactions, and to see so many organizations proudly feature the new Trustmark on their websites!

And finally, HR Intervals. Throughout the year, labour market challenges continued. We know the average salary in most charities and nonprofits is significantly lower than in other sectors. Moreover, only a small percentage of organizations have paid talent to look after their people. These two factors put us behind in competing with governments and businesses for talent. Helping to fill the gap on the HR front is HR Intervals, our newest service launched in 2021 and which continues to grow, offering free access to a suite of useful resources. Recognizing that charities and nonprofits must take decent work seriously and find ways to position themselves as competitive employers is key.

At Imagine, we made decent work a major priority. We knew that to be there for the sector and continue to build momentum on numerous fronts, we needed to support the well-being of our team. After months of planning, we launched a four-day work week pilot in 2023. The goal of this pilot was two-fold: to ensure our staff could maintain a work-life balance and show up to work on Monday morning fully reenergized, and to position us as a best-in-class employer that attracts and retains top talent. What initially started as a six-month pilot has continued, given the strong indicators of success: for example, there has been a 66% increase in the overall

wellbeing of our staff and sick days have been reduced by 40%. We've achieved this without compromising our impact, with overall productivity remaining consistent. I want to take this opportunity to thank our incredible Imagine Canada team. It is because of their dedicated, sustained efforts that we as an organization can create momentum. We owe thanks, too, to our board. Our volunteers. And equally important, the deep relationships we have developed with other organizations. Momentum on initiatives and advocacy efforts stay strong because of the incredible network they exist within. It was a challenging year, but from that, we leveraged our collective strength to build up and forward for years to come.

Land acknowledgment

Imagine Canada's staff, operations, work, and network depend on traditional Indigenous territories to provide us physical space, sustenance, safety, and community to work, live, and play.

Our physical head office is located on the traditional territory of many nations including the Mississaugas of the Credit, the Anishinabeg, the Haudenosaunee, and the Wendat (Wyandot). We acknowledge that these lands are covered by Treaty 13 and the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant. We acknowledge that these lands are still home to many diverse First Nations, Métis, and Inuit people.

We acknowledge that our ability to live and work on these lands today is a direct benefit of policies of expulsion and assimilation of Indigenous peoples during the time of settlement and Confederation, and since. The harms of these policies are many and are still being felt in Indigenous communities today. We express gratitude towards the Indigenous peoples who have and will continue to steward these lands.

We commit to amplifying the voices of Indigenous peoples and working against the everyday forces of white supremacy and colonialism present in the nonprofit sector.

Our team is actively engaging in training and education related to reconciliation and decolonization. We aim to listen, learn, and establish meaningful relationships with our Indigenous sector colleagues, engage in courageous conversations, and take actions that advance reconciliation in the nonprofit sector.

Our work at Imagine Canada is long-term and multigenerational in nature, and we recognize that it will be a continuous and intentional process to build strong relationships with our Indigenous colleagues and connect with the land.

Our Mission and Strategy

Charities and nonprofits are pillars of our society. Every day, from coast to coast to coast, nonprofit organizations, big and small, provide a vast range of essential services to thousands of people of all ages and backgrounds.

The 2.4 million people who work in the nonprofit sector are dedicated to supporting those in need and to helping enhance quality of life. Our sector not only serves an essential social purpose role, but by contributing 8.3% of our country's GDP, it also contributes to our collective economic prosperity.

At Imagine Canada, our mission is to support these organizations so that they can better serve individuals and communities both here and around the world. Through our advocacy efforts, research, and services, we help strengthen the sector, building our vision of a strong Canada where organizations work together alongside businesses and government to create resilient and vibrant communities.

To further realize this vision, we are committed to an ongoing process of becoming a more equity-driven, inclusive, transformative, and provocative player within and for the social good sector. This is why our work is guided by two complementary plans: a ten-year Strategic Planning Framework as well as a five-year Theory of Change.

Through reflection and dialogue with our Members and stakeholders, we developed our Theory of Change. This framework holds us accountable to our organization's impact on the nonprofit sector and communities, and clearly articulates how we plan to focus and evolve to accomplish transformative change.

Through the Theory of Change consultation process, we identified three foundational goals:

- Funding is flexible, reliable, and flows more equitably to organizations and communities
- The sector offers prosperous careers and is governed by courageous leaders with lived experience
- Voices traditionally at the margins are sought out and valued in decisions impacting our collective futures

So we may achieve our four strategic directions:

- Influencing the regulatory and policy environment in which social good organizations operate
- Ensuring decision-makers have access to timely and relevant knowledge about our sector
- Ensuring organizations are operating at the highest level of excellence
- Energizing the unique and diverse perspectives within our sector

Building a more equitable and inclusive nonprofit sector starts from within

At Imagine Canada, we envision a society that is fair and just for everyone. Nonprofit organizations, both individually and collectively, have a major role to play in ensuring that our communities are equitable, diverse, and inclusive.

As an organization that advocates for and supports the nonprofit sector, shifting our focus to advancing anti-racism and anti-oppression (ARAO), both in our organization and our work to support the sector, has been an ongoing process for the past few years. Since 2020, we have been on a journey to profoundly change our culture, our ways of working, and our priorities to reflect values of equity and social justice, and to intentionally weave ARAO approaches into every aspect of our work.

In 2022, as part of the Theory of Change process, we conducted extensive consultations with the sector. The objective was to identify priority areas for Imagine Canada to focus on. Equity and social justice were central themes that continually emerged during the consultations, reaffirming our commitment to advancing equity and anti-racism within our organization, the sector, and our communities.

Our goal is to fearlessly center equity in everything we do. To achieve this, we had to change the way we worked and operated. One of the significant shifts has been made possible by our Theory of Change, which is integrated into our operational plan. Through this process, we now aim to ensure that the ARAO and EDI principles are embedded in any project or initiative we plan - from programs and services to policy and advocacy efforts and research projects. We also have staff-led and board-led ARAO Working Groups to help our organization stay accountable to this commitment.

Notably, two of our recent major studies focus on equity and anti-racism. The first project, From the Mind to the Heart: Advancing Equity in Corporate Social Investment, is a study that explores the influence of justice, access, inclusion, diversity, and equity (JAIDE) within the corporate community investment profession, and the beliefs, culture, and practices that inhibit or enable equity within corporate nonprofit partnerships. This study was released in January 2023.

The second, Shifting Power Dynamics: Equity, diversity and inclusion in the nonprofit sector, explores what nonprofits and charities are doing to advance equity, diversity, and inclusion. This project was led by a working

group of the Equitable Recovery Collective, a group of nonprofit organizations working to advance equity in nonprofit sector policy, foster a more equitable funding environment, and build sector-wide capacity to advance equity in nonprofit organizations. This study was published in July 2023.

There is still much for us to learn, and more progress to make. We are grateful to you, our stakeholders, for helping us shape this work, and for keeping us accountable. We remain committed to leveraging our position of privilege and power to advance equity and justice within our sector and society as a whole.



Membership

Propelled by a strong network of nonprofit organizations, big and small

It takes collective efforts to spark change, inspire action, and build thriving communities. This work cannot be accomplished alone: the strength of our <u>Membership network</u> is the key to our collective success.

Imagine Canada Members play a critical role in helping to improve the operating environment of nonprofits and charities. Members' contributions propel our work, influencing the sector agenda and ensuring the needs and interests of organizations of all magnitudes and intersections are reflected in an equitable way.

Through events, webinars, consultations, networking activities, and dialogue with peers, Members share their unique and diverse perspectives, leveraging collective learning. These opportunities strengthen one's own organizations, while also contributing to a stronger sector. Throughout the year, we keep Members abreast of our work, and of emerging trends and critical issues that affect our sector. This inspirational work happens in all corners of the Membership network, but most notably at these following events:

Monthly policy chats

Members gather for our monthly meetings, which focus on public policy and government relations. These chats are an opportunity to share information with Members, invite their participation in our collective work, and hear about their concerns.

Leadership Roundtable

This event is open to all Members. Roundtable activities include panel discussions, workshops, and networking opportunities. In 2023, the event took place in Ottawa, where more than 100 representatives of charities and nonprofits from across the country attended.

Policy & Advocacy


The federal government has the authority to address many of the systemic challenges faced by our sector, but it will not - and cannot - develop truly enabling policy for charities and nonprofits on its own.

It is incumbent on the sector to develop proposed solutions on a host of varied policy areas and influence government decision-making. We alone know our true potential, and it is up to us to work together to convince the government to unleash it.

In 2023, a greater ability to convene and meet in person propelled our efforts to seek alignment on key issues among organizations, to prioritize among these issues, and to build bridges between the sector and decision-makers in Ottawa. This work also increasingly focused on, and was informed by, issues relating to anti-racism, anti-oppression, equity, diversity and inclusion.

Budget Coalition: weaving together network leadership

A diverse group of more than 50 sector leaders from a wide range of charities and nonprofits gathered in Ottawa in April to identify pan-sectoral priorities that could be advanced through the federal government's pre-budget consultation process. This effort contributed to a marked increase in the number of submissions made to the House of Commons Finance committee by charities and nonprofits for this budget cycle. More organizations included pan-sectoral priorities in their submissions than in previous years, which likely contributed to the inclusion of recommendations in the Committee's report about support for the nonprofit sector's labour force, the creation of a national volunteer strategy, improvements to granting processes, and more.



Policy & Advocacy (Continued)

Maintaining tax incentives for charitable giving

In Budget 2023, the government proposed changes to the Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT) that would weaken financial incentives for high-income donors and result in the loss of donations for many organizations, at a time when demand is increasing. After conducting stakeholder outreach and analysis of this issue, we launched an advocacy campaign asking the government to remove charity-related changes from the suite of AMT changes, while raising awareness to the sector and Canadians of the impact of these changes. After sustained advocacy by sector organizations, the government announced, in Budget 2024, plans to revise their previous proposal and mitigate the potential threat to donations.

Hill Day: collectively influencing federal policy

Our annual Hill Day is an important opportunity for nonprofit organizations - particularly smaller, equity-seeking organizations - to collectively influence federal policy development. In September 2023, 45 organizations participated in the event, where more than 40 meetings with MPs, Senators, and their staff took place. The discussions focused on a number of key priorities, including: making federal funding more equitable and effective; the creation of a home in government for the nonprofit sector; a sector-wide labour and workforce strategy; collecting better data for effective decision-making; and raising awareness about the impact the proposed changes to the Alternative Minimum Tax would have on donations.

Home in Government: keeping the momentum high

In 2023, after years of advocacy, the government signalled support for the creation of a 'Home in Government' for the nonprofit sector by tasking a Minister and a Parliamentary Secretary with advancing this issue. To maintain momentum on this critical file, we undertook a process to renew and refresh our knowledge and evidence base in support of a fulsome recommendation that is forward-looking, sustainable, and has the support of as much of the sector as possible. This work included a review of other national contexts, expert interviews, direct sector engagement through town halls and policy documents, conversations with varied and diverse sector representation, and several dozen meetings with Parliamentarians and civil servants, including those held during our Hill Day, and a roundtable with Parliamentary Secretary Ya'ara Saks

featuring leaders from a host of

sector intermediary organizations.





Policy & Advocacy (Continued)

Strengthening digital skills in charities and nonprofits

Digital skills within nonprofit organizations are essential for mission delivery in today's fast-paced world. As part of our role as co-founder of the Canadian Centre for Nonprofit Digital Resilience (CCNDR), and in collaboration with partners, we started work in late 2023 on a major project that aims to develop a pan-Canadian understanding of the size and nature of the digital skills gap in the nonprofit sector. The project will produce critical information to support capacity development within organizations, federal policymaking and program development related to digital adoption, and to advance sector-wide skills and labour force development. In addition, we submitted a brief to a Parliamentary committee study on the impact of artificial intelligence on the Canadian workforce to ensure that the sector's voice was heard.

Advocating for more and better data on the sector

The sector lacks critical data on both registered charities and nonprofit organizations. Alongside our peers and members of the Federal Nonprofit Data Coalition, we are advocating for more and better data on the charitable and nonprofit sector, greater sector involvement in data-collection initiatives that affect us, and that data about the sector be published in accessible, user-friendly formats. Concrete progress in 2023 included improvements to the nonprofit sample of the Canadian Survey of Business Conditions (CSBC),

the inclusion of questions about donations in the CSBC, the release of updated labour force data through the Satellite Account of Nonprofit Institutions and Volunteering Human Resources Module, the release of data about rural nonprofit organizations, and sector involvement in the development of the first survey of nonprofit organizations conducted by Statistics Canada in more than 20 years.

Making federal funding more equitable and effective

The federal government's policy shift toward short-term project funding fails to cover the full costs of service delivery. This leaves organizations scrambling to cover mission-critical expenses, putting services to communities at risk. It also leads to low wages, few benefits and precarious work for our diverse workforce. In 2023, we continued to advocate for increased core funding for our sector and improvements to the effectiveness, efficiency and equity of federal funding practices.

We also nurtured the development of the Funding Reform Working Group (FRWG)

- a diverse collective of nonprofits and charities from multiple regions and mission areas. The FRWG will advocate on federal funding issues over the coming years.



Research & Analysis

Supporting the sector means ensuring decision-makers have access to in-depth, data-driven, and timely information—that's where our research comes in. 2023 was a research-heavy year for Imagine Canada: our team authored four research reports, continued providing quarterly analyses of trends affecting the sector, and launched a new public opinion polling initiative. Our research informs sector leaders, private sector funders, and government policymakers.


Released in January 2023, From the Mind to the Heart is a two-part, first-of-its-kind report exploring the relationship between justice, access, inclusion, diversity, and equity (JAIDE) and the Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) profession. Produced in collaboration with AgentsC, key findings

reveal an inadequacy in demonstrable JAIDE practices beyond positive sentiment and training and an equityinhibiting lack of Black and Indigenous sector professionals. We also found that companies generally view corporate community investment as a low priority. The first report draws from studies on CSR and corporate community investment in Canada and focuses on the overlooked perspectives of Black, Indigenous, South Asian, South Asian-Muslim and 2SLGBTQI CSR practitioners. It ends by asking: what's next? The second report answers that question by sharing student youth perspectives on CSR in Canada. The study highlights what companies must do to authentically advance diversity and incorporate the principles of JAIDE into their community investment programs.

Research & Analysis (Continued)



Advancing equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI) is top-of-mind for many nonprofit leaders, but few pursue it with deep intentionality. This is one of the key findings of *Shifting Power Dynamics*, the first comprehensive report on the nonprofit sector's commitment to EDI. The report explores the impact of organization size, operational leadership, and equity working groups on EDI practices. Notably, it shows that organizations led by Black and Indigenous people tend to do more to advance EDI, regardless of organization size. The findings also highlight the key role funders play in advancing EDI. Shifting mindsets and dedicating time and resources are critical to making meaningful progress. The research project page includes recommendations for organizations to improve their EDI practices.

This research project was led by the Equitable Recovery Collective and funded by Scotiabank (Lead Partner), The Canadian Red Cross Society (Sector Partner), and Community Foundations of Canada and KCI (Knowledge Partners).


What are the motivations for engaging in social finance? What are the enablers and barriers? Can organizations use it to increase their resilience? Based on more than twenty case studies, cross-case analysis, participant validation, and an expert group survey, *Journey to Impact* offers insights into Canada's social finance ecosystem. Crucially, for social finance to fulfill its potential, all ecosystem actors must understand the factors that help and hinder

organizations in their efforts to use social finance tools. The role of consultants—who play a major role in helping organizations navigate the ecosystem—is also explored. The report highlights the pivotal role of network development, capacity building, and more.

This project was funded by the Government of Canada's Investment Readiness Program.

Quarterly Sector Trend Analyses

Each quarter—leveraging data from the Canadian Survey of Business Conditions alongside other sources—we publish an analysis of emerging sector trends on the Imagine 360 blog. From inflation and immigration in Q1 to cybersecurity challenges in Q4 (and so much more in between), this series helps nonprofit professionals contextualize their work, and our government and corporate partners understand how they can best support organizations. Organizations dealt with multiple intersecting crises, and the through line of 2023 was increasing demand from communities—we expect this to be a consistent, long-term challenge that we will continue to cover throughout 2024.

Public Opinion Polling

Thanks to the generous support of BMO, we launched a series of public opinion polls to probe Canadians' opinions and sentiments on various topics related to the nonprofit and charitable sector. The data collected through these polls helps us understand where Canadians stand on social issues and the nonprofit sector's role in addressing them. We leverage the data in a variety of ways, notably in our public policy and government relations work, and in public relations campaigns. Opinion letters citing the data were published in the media <u>Le Devoir, The Globe and Mail</u>, and <u>The Hill Times</u>.

SERVICES & PROGRAMS

2023 was another challenging year for charities and nonprofits. Organizations continued to grapple with high demand and increased costs amid rising inflation. Securing donations and attracting talent also continued to be a constant challenge. We continued to evolve our programs and services to better support organizations now and in the future.











Standards

Standards Accreditation was created to empower nonprofit leaders to improve accountability and performance at their organizations by providing them with a roadmap to elevate operational excellence. When organizations complete the accreditation process, they earn the right to use the Trustmark, which signals to donors, staff, volunteers and the public alike that an organization is well-run and governed at the highest levels.

To better highlight this achievement, in 2023 we introduced a new visual identity for the program, complete with a brand new Trustmark.

The new design is a more impactful symbol that gives the Standards a stronger sense of distinction, one that represents its unique nature of being co-created and governed by nonprofit leaders. Just as the program was created by and for the sector, the design was chosen based on feedback from donors, funders, accredited organizations and sector leaders. Bold, luminous, the design is reminiscent of a star, and a lighthouse. These symbols represent what accreditation is all about: a north star lighting the way to provide guidance on the path to organizational resilience.

There are currently over 270 charities and nonprofits accredited under our Standards Program, with 60 more working on their applications. These organizations can proudly display the Trustmark, signaling to stakeholders that they have met the rigorous criteria of the Standards, and take accountability and good governance seriously.

Organizations that are interested in improving their practices—but not ready to pursue accreditation—can consult the standards, which are publicly available, and access a free gap analysis tool to help them identify the gaps in their governance processes and get a sense of their progress toward organizational excellence.

Grant Connect includes thousands of funding opportunities for organizations, with data that uncovers the interests, expectations, and giving behaviour of foundations, corporate funders, and government agencies. Users save time and put their energy where it's most needed.


In 2023, we focused on developing key partnerships to increase capacity for small BIPOC-led and BIPOC-serving organizations. First, we contributed to the creation of the B3 Capacity Development Program founded by the Black Canadian Fundraisers' Collective and Black Opportunity Fund. Second, we partnered with Social Impact Consulting to deliver a fundraising workshop and offer free one-on-one coaching sessions to Grant Connect subscribers from small BIPOC-serving organizations. Participants in both initiatives will benefit from Grant Connect's improvements for those seeking funding for non-qualified donees.

Finally, we took steps towards significant improvements in data collection and activation. We worked with the CRA Charities Directorate as a pilot organization for cloud data transfers, integrated

corporate funding opportunities and data from our 2022 Fundtracker platform acquisition, and developed a prototype for a data platform that has the ability to unify our social enterprise data, product metrics, and gift data to give us a unique lens on the institutional funding environment in Canada.

We also began exploring applications of generative AI to both Grant Connect and our internal processes.

Our team is continuing its efforts to use Grant Connect as an instrument to effect social change and improve the funding environment for both organizations and funders.




HR Intervals

Thanks to our <u>HR Intervals</u> content platform, nonprofit professionals have access to free, bilingual HR management resources specifically designed for them. Since our launch, we have exceeded expectations for traffic and engagement. This confirmed how crucial the need is for accessible HR resources for nonprofit professionals.

Leaders and managers come to HRIntervals.ca to access articles and resources that they can use to attract the right candidates, foster a positive work environment, and promote decent work. The educational and practical materials available reflect our sector's unique and evolving needs related to HR management on key topics—such as succession planning, recruitment, and more.

In 2023, in collaboration with our team of dedicated volunteer HR professionals and led by our newly hired Manager, Digital Content, we added a key section on learning, training, and development. In addition, a lot of planning work happened behind the scenes to support the upcoming expansion of the website and the growth of the service offerings in 2024 and beyond.



Caring Company Certification

Since 1988, the <u>Caring Company Certification</u> has been a leading indicator of excellence in corporate community investment. The certification and our thought leadership have encouraged more funding to flow to nonprofit organizations, leading to more effective partnerships between the nonprofit and corporate sectors.



Canadian companies set their community investment budgets according to our 1% benchmark, and our research is leveraged in executive offices across the country to determine better strategies for giving and volunteering.

Corporate research

In January 2023, we published a two-part study on JAIDE (Justice, Access, Inclusion, Diversity, and Equity) in corporate community investment, in partnership with AgentsC Inc. and with the support of the RBC Foundation. Through the diversity of perspectives presented in the study, fundamental gaps and oversights in representation, intentionality, and leadership were uncovered. The study also highlights what companies must do to authentically advance diversity and incorporate the principles of JAIDE into their community investment programs.

Certification program

Caring Companies set the standard in community investment in Canada. Our annual review of participating companies showed that our Caring Companies contributed over \$650M to Canadian communities in their previous fiscal period.

These results are notable. However, much more can be achieved, and this is why, in 2023, with support from the RBC Foundation, we continued the work started in 2022 to modernize and strengthen the program to reflect rapidly changing societal expectations of corporate social impact. With this new program, we aim to inspire courageous goals, disrupt funding inequalities, and create more authentic trusting relationships between corporations and their community partners.


To achieve this goal, our team has been working with a steering committee to support the redesign of the program. The committee includes 22 representatives from the nonprofit and corporate sectors. The collective work of the committee led to the identification of five themes that will lend rigor to the new program. The themes are: reporting on impact, partnerships and collaboration, community investment strategy, truth and reconciliation, and equity, diversity, and inclusion.

We engaged a consultant to support the development of criteria and demonstration of practices, for the themes of truth and reconciliation and equity, diversity, and inclusion.


Twelve companies, including some of Canada's leading brands, are participating in the pilot of the new program. Feedback from these pilot participants will be evaluated to inform the final design of the program, which is expected to launch towards the end of 2024.
